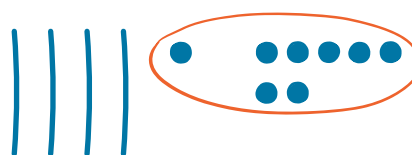
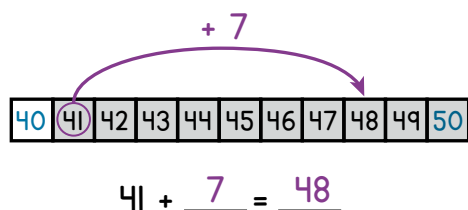

Addition of One-Digit and Two-Digit Numbers

Dear Family,

Your student is learning to add a one-digit number to a two-digit number. They solve by using a variety of tools, such as cubes, drawings, number bonds, and number paths. Your student is practicing the strategy of making the next ten to create easier problems, and then they explain their thinking.



$$\begin{array}{r} 41 + 7 = 48 \\ 40 + 1 + 7 = 48 \\ \quad \quad \quad \downarrow \\ \quad \quad \quad 8 \end{array}$$

Make the next ten

$$\begin{array}{r} 27 + 8 \\ \quad \quad \quad \downarrow \\ \quad \quad \quad 3 \quad 5 \\ 30 + 5 = 35 \end{array}$$

7 and 3 make ten, so 27 and 3 make the next ten, which is 30.

At-Home Activities

Partners to 10

Say a number from 1 to 9. Ask your student to identify that number's partner to 10, as in the following examples.

- If you say 4, your student says 6.
- If you say 8, your student says 2.
